Twenty years later, we have supported more than 1,000 independent filmmakers and helped move more than \$32 million to over 400 environmental film projects. But the real measure of our impact goes beyond numbers. It's in the policy and structural changes sparked by the films we support. It's in the communities who have been mobilized by stories that center their voices. And it's in our treasured collaborators and supporters who see this work as a legacy worth advancing.





Our Programs in Action

How we resource filmmakers, mobilize collective action,
and expand the market for environmental storytelling.

1 FILMMAKER GRANTS



Through our two-year grants program, filmmakers receive \$25,000 and mentorship in the first year, and select projects receive additional funding to complete their films and amplify their impact in the second year. In October, eight projects from the 2024-25 cohort **received \$400,000** total to bring their solutions-forward environmental stories across the finish line.

2 FILMMAKER SUMMIT



Our 2024-25 grantee cohort gathered at Mountainfilm Festival for a two-day summit to workshop environmental stories, navigate today's funding landscape, and build community. The program featured a keynote by Environmental Grantmakers Association President Tamara Toles O'Laughlin, advisory sessions with film industry leaders, community building opportunities, and festival screenings of Redford Center-supported films *Enraizados* and *Between Moon Tides*.

3 \$100,000 IMPACT FUND



To invest in transforming films into real-world impact, we launched our Impact Fund, awarding \$100,000 to five environmental films: *The Here Now Project*, *KULEANA*, *Remaining Native*, *Symphony of Silence*, and *VS. Goliath*. Supported by the Manitou Fund, Tauck Family Foundation, and Baker Family Foundation, the grants help filmmakers design strategic campaigns that drive measurable change.

4 FISCAL SPONSORSHIP



Our Fiscal Sponsorship program allows media makers to raise tax-deductible donations for their projects through our extended 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status, making it one of the most powerful fundraising tools for independent filmmakers. In 2025, we onboarded 9 new fiscally sponsored films for a total of 32 active projects, and disbursed \$5.5 million dollars to filmmakers through the program.

5 SOLUTIONS FILMS SHORTS



We funded four short films spotlighting Indigenous women-led efforts to reforest land, protect wildlife, decolonize forests, and reclaim sovereignty. Produced in collaboration with Pat Mitchell and the Helen Gurley Brown Foundation, the initiative culminated in a live-streamed conversation with the filmmakers about their impact campaigns. Donations went to the group Indigenous Climate Action.

6 NATURE CONNECTION PITCH



To spotlight stories of restoring humanity's interdependent connection to nature, we launched our fourth Nature Connection Pitch in partnership with DC/DOX. Five finalists will pitch live at the Washington, D.C. documentary festival in June 2026, with each receiving at least \$10,000 in production and impact funding, and one taking home a \$50,000 grand prize.

7 NATURE CONNECTION X REI PARTNERSHIP



BOYZ N THE WOOD

We partnered with the REI Cooperative Action Fund to produce short films featuring organizations that break down barriers for all communities to get outdoors.

8 FILMS THAT MOVE



FAMILY TREE

We hosted 16 free virtual film screenings, spanning stories from citizen scientists protecting endangered birds in Rhode Island (*Between Moon Tides*) to a homemaker-turned-journalist uncovering a government coverup near abandoned coal mines in Siberia (*Black Snow*). The free screenings broadened the audiences of complex issues that are both personal and urgent.

9 BRIDGING VALUES



IMPOSSIBLE TOWN

To bridge the political divide on environmental issues, we launched our Bridging Environmental Values initiative, showcasing nine films that connect across ideological lines through shared values: clean air and water, thriving communities, and a livable future. In partnership with Bridge Entertainment Labs and Working Films, we're bringing this work to communities nationwide.



The Impact Model

THE IMPACT MODEL

Real world change starts with a story. We support the bold filmmakers whose work sets that change in motion.



Measuring What Matters

We know films create change because we see the evidence. As part of our practice to keep learning and iterating, we ask filmmakers in our active portfolio: How is your work driving impact? This year, 79 projects received the survey, and 63% responded.

Their answers prove our theory of change works.

Impact outcomes fall into three categories – narrative shifts, power shifts, and systemic shifts – a shared framework for measuring how films serve as tools for environmental action.

The conclusion:

Engaging government, connecting movements, and improving health and well-being.

Meaningful Grants. Massive Impact.

We resource filmmakers with grants, strategic guidance, and industry connections. We connect independent voices to distribution power and engaged audiences. And we show philanthropists how film amplifies their environmental priorities. We are the connective tissue the movement needs.

Undamming Klamath →

\$175,000 in grants

NARRATIVE SHIFTS

The film reframed dam removal as an ecological and moral imperative, centering Indigenous leadership through intimate footage that revealed how dams devastate salmon runs and livelihoods.

POWER SHIFTS

Major news outlets used film footage to amplify Indigenous and environmental advocates' voices, strengthening their influence in public and policy debates.

SYSTEMIC SHIFTS

The filmmakers' coalition-building approach became a replicable model, informing dam-removal campaigns and cross-stakeholder strategies worldwide.

Razing Liberty Square

\$95,000 in grants

NARRATIVE SHIFTS

The film introduced the term "climate gentrification" to wide audiences, showing the stark intersection between climate justice and housing justice.

POWER SHIFTS

By strategically premiering outside Miami first, the campaign built national pressure before the local screening, forcing Miami officials to publicly respond to Liberty Square residents' demands.

SYSTEMIC SHIFTS

After watching the film, communities in New York, Los Angeles, Maui, and other cities used it as a blueprint to re-examine redevelopment plans and build coalitions to protect marginalized communities.

Enraizados →

\$37,682 in grants

NARRATIVE SHIFTS

By spotlighting Cherán nationally and internationally, the film catalyzed plans for a local media hub and training program, enabling residents to tell and sustain their own stories.

POWER SHIFTS

The film elevated Cherán's Indigenous self-governance model as a blueprint, inspiring communities facing illegal land grabs and deforestation to pursue Indigenous-led solutions.

SYSTEMIC SHIFTS

Mexico's lead climate negotiator incorporated the film's community-centered perspectives into policy discussions, directly informing the country's approach to Action for Climate Empowerment.

Standing Above the Clouds

\$23,000 distributed through fiscal sponsorship

NARRATIVE SHIFTS

The film became a mobilization tool for Mauna Kea protectors, using screenings, workshops, and art installations to build public support and help drive their petition toward 500,000 signatures.

POWER SHIFTS

The film strengthened movement capacity by sharing practical campaign skills – fundraising, event negotiation, social media strategy – expanding power beyond the screen to organizers and filmmakers across the ecosystem.

SYSTEMIC SHIFTS

By embedding skill-sharing and movement-building into its distribution strategy, the film created a replicable model for impact-driven filmmaking that's reshaping how the industry supports frontline-led campaigns.

Nuraga Bhumi

NARRATIVE SHIFTS

The film dismantles colonial conservation narratives by centering Indigenous stewardship, challenging audiences to rethink who should lead environmental protection.

POWER SHIFTS

The film is mobilizing women, youth, and LGBTQIA+ communities to reclaim their role in protecting wild spaces, expanding who holds power in conservation.

SYSTEMIC SHIFTS

Wildlife authorities publicly endorsed women's leadership on camera for the first time, catalyzing a broader shift toward inclusive conservation across Sumatra.

Path of → the Panther

\$20,000 in grants

NARRATIVE SHIFTS

The film reframed the Florida panther not as an isolated species, but as a keystone indicator of ecosystem and human health, helping viewers understand wildlife corridors as essential infrastructure for Florida's future.

POWER SHIFTS

The film galvanized a coalition of conservation advocates, scientists, and community leaders, building public momentum that elevated their influence in land-use and development fights.

SYSTEMIC SHIFTS

The film helped secure passage of the Florida Wildlife Corridor Act and established a global blueprint for habitat conservation. Its coalition-building strategies are now being replicated to build cross-ideological support worldwide.
